



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Gerald Roberts: In memoriam

GERALD (Gerry) ROBERTS
Ropewalk, Penpol.



Gerry died peacefully at home on 1st October, aged 80. He was born and educated in Cardiff and, after appointments in both the Vale of Glamorgan and Staffordshire, he moved to Cornwall in March 1964, to the post of Treasurer to the Cornwall Hospital Management Committee, later to become Treasurer to the Cornwall and Isles of Scilly Area Health Authority.

After 13 years living in Truro, he and Irene moved to Penpol where they enjoyed their new life and made so many good friends. In addition to his post at the Cornwall A.H.A. Gerry made representations to London and he also directed the finances for the setting up of both the Rheumatology and Haematology Departments. He was well re-

spected by consultants and colleagues. He became President of Truro Lions Club and later Zone Chairman and Deputy District Governor of Lions International. He was one of the early members of the Victoria Investment Club, Chairman and then Treasurer during his membership, resigning when the venue became unsuitable for his condition.

After four years of health problems, it was really during the last two years that Gerry was so ill and suffered a lot of pain - even the doctors were puzzled and unable to make a firm diagnosis, other than "no malignancy."

Gerry's widow, Irene, continues living in Ropewalk. Their daughter, Helen, lives in Dartmouth and son, Andrew, lives in London. They have four grandsons, of whom they are very proud.

2008 was a busy year for the PQA, the major project of the Quay extension being successfully completed in February. The first season of use has been very successful without any complaints and little or no misuse. Signage and bollards are being installed this month. To relieve pressure on the need to organise and run annual fund raising events to cover the insurance for the Quay, a pledge scheme was instigated which raised almost £1200 this year (excluding any Gift Aid income still to come at 22%) – approximately £300 of which has been promised as an annual pledge. Huge thanks are extended to all who have contributed pledges etc. Also huge thanks go to Howard Spiers whose aerial photograph has raised more than £1000 for the PQA.

Thanks to volunteers who have kept grass cut and hedges trimmed and, once again, ensured our annual maintenance costs to zero. There are some areas of loose stones around the quay



and alongside the slipway and we will be discussing repairs with the Parish in the coming year. PQA is registered as a charity on everyclick.com. If you use everyclick as your search engine and nominate PQA as your chosen charity we get funds every time you click on a search result. To date we have received £107 from everyclick and our 21 supporters— so get clicking!

Perfect weather this year resulted in a very successful regatta. Thanks to the regatta committee for organising the event and for their donation to the PQA. Note for your diary, next year's event is on 11th July.

Sadly John Wilson (top row, second from right) has decided to step down from the committee. John has been a stalwart for the PQA over the years and his valuable contribution will be sorely missed, not least behind the bar at fund raising events! We wish him well for his 'retirement.'

THE LUNCH CLUB

The Luncheon Club's highlight of the year is almost upon us!

Every month [with a break in Summer] a team, from the 8 to 10 cooks, bottle-washers and serving wenches in the village, prepares, cooks and washes up mountains of food and dishes for up to 30 local residents. The work does not stop there: menus are planned a year ahead taking into account the availability of produce and the feedback about previous dishes; buyers are sent out monthly to scour the area, negotiate prices, and purchase the necessary foodstuffs; a treasurer accounts for the subscriptions [currently £3.50 a meal] and associated costs - the object is to break even. After each lunch,

kitchen and function room [at the rear of the chapel and ideal for occasions of this sort] are left scrupulously clean and tables and chairs returned to storage. Many of the team hold a Certificate in Basic Food Hygiene, and there are visits by the Health Inspector with which to deal.

The Christmas lunch is more than a meal - turkey of course and all the usual accompaniments followed by Christmas pudding and mince pies, not to forget the crackers, presents and paper hats, with much laughter and ribaldry throughout. All the meetings are a social occasion. As much as anything else, this is what brings the "guests" back: the pleasures of meeting old friends and making a few new ones, even late in life. And for that reason alone we all regard it as a Club and not merely a diner! So we wish you all a heart-felt:
